REPORT OF THE CONTROLLER AND ACCOUNTANT-GENERAL ON THE PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ON THE CONSOLIDATED FUND FOR THE MONTH OF JANUARY 2016

1.1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Mandate

Section 41(1) (b) of the Financial Administration Act, 2003 (Act 654)(FAA) and Regulation 191 of the Financial Administration Regulations 2004, (LI 1802)(FAR) requires the Controller and Accountant-General to prepare and transmit to the Auditor-General and the Minister of Finance (MoF), the Public Accounts (Financial Statements) on the Consolidated Fund of the Republic of Ghana within 15 days of the preceding month or such other period as Parliament may by resolution determine.

The financial statements which are prepared on government business are regulated by the financial laws. The authorisation to spend and limit on expenditure are stipulated in the Appropriation Act for each financial year as required by Article 179 (2) (a) of the 1992 Constitution.

In addition to the legal requirement, the Financial Statements are meant to provide a summary of government's financial resources and their application for the benefit of the people of Ghana.

1.1.2 Components of the Financial Statements

The financial statements comprise:

- A Balance Sheet
- A Statement of Revenue and Expenditure
- A Statement of Receipts and Payments
- A Cash Flow Statement
- Notes to the Accounts

1.1.3 Scope of financial statements

In compliance with Articles 175 and 176 of the Constitution of the Republic of Ghana and Section 41 of the FAA, these financial statements known as the Public Accounts of Ghana are prepared on the Consolidated Fund only. It comprises the financial activities of the Ministries, Departments and Agencies (MDAs) and Metropolitan Municipal District Assemblies (MMDAs) funded from the national budget.

The financial statements do not include other public funds established by or under the authority of an Act of Parliament and Retained Internally Generated Funds.

1.1.4 Basis of Accounting

The financial statements are prepared on modified accrual basis. Modified accrual accounting recognizes revenues when they become available and lodged into the treasury accounts of Government and with a few exceptions, recognizes expenditures when liabilities are incurred. This system divides available funds into separate entities within the organization to ensure that the money is being spent where it was intended. Fixed Assets are capitalized in order to be written off over the expected life of the asset.

2 HIGHLIGHTS OF JANUARY, 2016 FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

2.1 2016 Appropriation

The amounts appropriated for Government business and reflected in these Financial Statements are regulated by the 2016 Appropriation. Payments made were based on warrants issued on the authority of the Minister of Finance and as at end of January 2016, was within the Appropriation of GH¢50,109.85 million.

3.0 SUMMARYOF RECEIPTS AND PAYMENTS

The summary of Receipts and Payments on the Consolidated Fund for the month of January 2016 is as follows:

In the month of January, total receipts fell below the budget by GH¢2,878.41 million. Total payments also fell below budget by GH¢2,784.32 million giving rise to a net unfavourable variance of GH¢94.09 million.

4.0 SUMMARY OF REVENUE AND EXPENDITURE

The summary of Revenue and Expenditure on the Consolidated Fund for the month of January 2016 is as follows:

Actual Revenue fell below the budget by $GH \notin 1,947.30$ for the month of January. Actual expenditure also fell below the budget by $GH \notin 1,707.01$ million in the same period. This gave rise to a net unfavourable variance of $GH \notin 240.29$.

5.0 ADDITIONALSTATISTICS

5.1 **REVENUE**

Total Revenue which is made up of Direct and Indirect Taxes, Grants and other Non-tax revenue was 36.05% of the budget. Below is the contribution of the various components to this unfavourable variance.

5.1.1 Direct Tax

Direct tax revenue for the Consolidated Fund for the month ended as detailed in Note 2 was GH¢676.97 million as against the expected amount of GH¢1,006.00 million. This indicates an unfavourable variance of GH¢329.03 million or 32.71% below budget.

Direct tax contributed 61.67% of total revenue for the month of January.

5.1.2 Indirect Tax

Indirect tax as shown in Note 3 was $GH\phi417.81$ million against a budget of $GH\phi1,304.27$ million. This resulted in an unfavourable variance of $GH\phi886.46$ million or 67.97% below the budget.

Indirect Tax contributed 38.06% of total revenue for the period. Tax exemptions are excluded from the indirect tax budget

5.1.3 Grants

There were no Grants as indicated in Note 5 for the month of January against a budget of GH¢133.99 million.

5.1.4 Non - Tax Revenue

Non - Tax Revenue as detailed in Note 6 for the month of January was $GH \notin 2.98$ million as against a budgeted amount of $GH \notin 600.81$ million, resulting in an unfavourable variance of $GH \notin 597.83$ million or 99.50% below the budgeted. Non Tax Revenue contributed 0.27% of total revenue for the period.

5.1.5 Loans Received

There were no Loans received for the month of January as against the budget of GH¢ 588.58 million.

5.2 EXPENDITURE

Expenditure is made up of Compensation of Employees, Use of Goods and Services, Consumption of Fixed Capital, Interest, Subsidies, Grants, Social Benefits and Others. The total expenditure on accrual basis for the month amounted to $GH \notin 1,456.52$ million as against the budget of $GH \notin 3,163.53$ million. This resulted in a favourable variance of $GH \notin 1,707.01$ million or 53.96% above budget.

5.2.1 Compensation of Employees

Compensation of Employees including arrears incurred for the month as detailed in note eleven (11) was $GH \notin 1,084.07$ million as against the budgeted figure of $GH \notin 1,187.40$ million. This gives a favourable variance of $GH \notin 103.33$ million. Compensation of Employees represents 74.43% of total expenditure for the month.

5.2.2 Use of Goods and Services

Expenditure on Goods and Services incurred for the month as detailed in note twelve (12) was GH¢7.88 million as against the budgeted figure of GH¢871.10 million resulting in an favourable variance of GH¢863.22 million. Goods and Services represent 0.54% of total expenditure for the month.

5.2.3 Interest

Interest for the month as detailed in note fourteen (14) was GH¢ 364.58 million as against the budgeted figure of GH¢874.22 million, giving rise to a favourable variance of GH¢509.64 million. This represents 25.03% of total expenditure for the month.

5.2.4 Government Subsidies

There was no Government Subsidies for the month as detailed in note fifteen (15) as against the budgeted figure of $GH\phi4.17$ million, giving rise to a favourable variance of $GH\phi4.17$ million.

5.2.5 Social Benefits and Other Expenses

There was no expenditure incurred on social benefits and other expenses for the month ended January 2016 as against the budget of $GH \notin 129.28$ million and $GH \notin 97.38$ million respectively. This gave rise to a favourable variance of $GH \notin 129.28$ million and $GH \notin 97.38$ million respectively.

5.3 PUBLIC DEBT REPAYMENTS

Public Debt is made up of Domestic and External Debts as detailed in Note 18. However, there was no expenditure incurred for the month of January for public debt repayment as against a budget of GH¢305.35 million, resulting in a favourable variance of GH¢305.35 million.

6 CONCLUSION
